FROM THE CHAPLAINS' DESK



Anzac Day occurs on 25 April. It commemorates all New Zealanders killed in war and honours our returned servicemen and women. The date itself marks the anniversary of the landing of New Zealand and Australian soldiers – the Anzacs – on the Gallipoli Peninsula in 1915.



New Zealanders have marked the landings at Gallipoli since news of the event first reached this country, and Anzac Day has been a public holiday since 1921. On this day the people of New Zealand have acknowledged the sacrifice of all those who have died in warfare, and the contribution and suffering of all those who have served.

Over time there have been changes in the way that the day has been commemorated, reflecting the changing features and concerns of our society. During the Second World War, for example, there was increased interest and a heightened sense of the relevance of Anzac Day; in the 1960s and decades following it was, from time to time, used as a platform for antiwar and other social protest.

Today, at a time when it seems New Zealanders are increasingly keen to assert and celebrate a unique identity, we recognise Anzac Day as a central marker of our nationhood.

The number of New Zealanders attending Anzac Day events in New Zealand, and at Gallipoli, is increasing. For some younger people, the sombre focus of the day receives less emphasis than do the more celebratory aspects of a national holiday. For most, though, the day is an occasion on which to formally pay tribute and to remember.

We here at Tamahere will be honouring ANZAC Day at a service in the Chapel at 11.00 am on Thursday 25th April 2019, followed by a "Front Line Luncheon" in the café to be served at 12.30 pm. The cost of this will be \$15.00 and will be charged to your monthly account. Your family members are also welcome to come along.

Atawhai Assisi Chaplain's Reflection

Sunday 31st March is the fourth Sunday in Lent. It is also known in some parts of the church family as Refreshment Sunday or Mothering Sunday. Refreshment Sunday because it marks the middle of the Lenten fast and has traditionally been marked with some relaxation of Lenten strictness, including the sharing of Simnel cake. Mothering Sunday because this was the traditional day for apprentices and young people working as servants to go home and visit their mothers,



bringing with them presents. They would also attend the village church or the Cathedral; the mother church. With Mothering Sunday in mind I'd like to share the story of a particular mother and disciple of Christ - Susanna Wesley.

Susanna was married to a preacher named Sam; unfortunately, a man who couldn't manage money. Their debt was so high Sam was once thrown into debtor's prison which doubled their problems. Twice the homes they lived in were burned to the ground, losing everything they owned. Apparently by their own church members who were extremely angry with what Sam preached.

They had 19 children; all except ten died in infancy. Susanna's husband frequently left her to raise the children alone for long periods of time. One of their children was crippled. Another couldn't talk until he was nearly six years old. Susanna herself was desperately sick most of her life.



When Susanna was young, she promised God that for every hour she spent in entertainment, she would give to Him an hour in prayer and in reading the Scriptures. Household demands and raising such a large family made this commitment an impossibility. She had *no* time for entertainment, let alone long hours in prayer. She worked the gardens, milked the cow, schooled the children and managed the entire house herself. Instead, she decided to give the Lord *two hours* a day in prayer.

She struggled to find a secret place to be alone with God. So, she told her children that when they saw her with her apron over her head, she was in prayer and must not be disturbed. It took time for them to learn she would not give them her attention. Each time one approached her, she would take down her apron, grasp a facecloth from the bowl of cold water beside her, wring it out, and without saying a word, wipe their faces clean. Receiving nothing but a cold, wet face wipe soon taught them that interrupting their mother's prayer times was not a good idea.

Susannah's very real and practical faith shaped the lives and ministries of her sons John and Charles. John, who preached to nearly a million people in his day, and Charles, who wrote over 9000 hymns, many of which we still sing today.

As we take this time to rest and reflect together midway on our Lenten journey, in many ways it feels like we are already struggling through Holy Week. Recent events reflect the shock, horror and grief of Jesus' disciples, then and now, in the face of terror and death. Thanks be to God, for the outpouring of love and grace and compassion which continue to flow in, around and through us as we unite together in the name of Love.

Let us continue to uphold one another in prayer, give thanks for all those who have brought us life, helped shape who we are and how we live, and inspired us with their faith and commitment to follow God's call upon their lives, with love and compassion and care.


